

Mission Statement, Core Values, and Vision- Chris Durrant

Mr. Durrant says we set out this year to accomplish a mission statement, core values, and vision for the club. Rob Moore came in and gave us some direction. We went through the bylaws and established lines of authority. The board creates the policies and the managers direct the staff on the day to day responsibilities. It is not the board's job to direct staff.



Board of Directors Roles and Responsibilities – Bylaws

The Board shall assume responsibility for implementing the policies, procedures and rules and regulations of the Club on behalf of its members.

2. Power and Duties

- a. Elect the offices of the Board
- b. Appoint committees and assign duties
- c. Fill vacancies on the Board until the next Annual Meeting, at which time the vacancy shall be filled for remainder of the original term by election:
- d. Employ or contract persons with management responsibilities. Review and delegate such responsibilities as is necessary and indicate the criteria for the evaluation of performance. Implement specific procedures for the employment or contracting of all employees.
- e. Assume responsibility for the development and publication of the Club rules, and regulations governing the use of the Club as needed;
- f. Establish the amount of the annual dues, fees and other charges;
- g. Remove and replace any Director for cause, at the determination of the Board;

Respect the Direct Lines of Authority

- No Board Member has the responsibility or authority to direct a manager.
- No Board Member has the responsibility or authority to direct a manager's employee.
- The Board's responsibility is to create, review and approve policy, as stated in the bylaws.
- The Board is then responsible to direct the General Manager to manage the club per approved policy or policies.

Mr. Durrant says we will respect the direct line of authority and follow this chain of command. For example, if you have a problem with Jace, don't go to a board member. Talk to Jace to resolve the issue, if it doesn't get resolved, talk to Bob, and if it's not resolved with Bob then talk to the general manager. The general manager can bring certain things to the board if it gets to that point. It goes up and down the lines of authority. What are our core values? Robbie Gale, Rob Moore, and myself did their research to establish core values for the club.

- 2. Integrity: We conduct ourselves with honesty, transparency, and ethical behavior in all interactions, maintaining the trust and respect of our members, employees, and the community.

- 6. Accountability: Ownership and accountability from Club management to staff and members.

Eric Iverson works for Renaissance Golf Design. He has a long portfolio of work. Thank you to Greg Gilmore and his team and here are some of the highlights.




Allocated a budget of \$1.75 million. \$110 K budget remaining

Sent out the initial letter to members on 11/14/22.


Undertook a major renovation, the club was fortunate, most courses would typically close at least 9 holes at a time for the duration of the project.

GROUNDS CREW HIGHLIGHTS

- •Executed 26,000 crew labor hours.
- •Oversaw a team of 26 individuals, including 7 full-time employees.
- Relocated sprinkler pipe and head layout for the construction project to accommodate new bunkers and tees.
- •Successfully maintained the golf course operational status by coordinating daily changes in construction with the architect, contractor and proshop.
- •Resolved drainage issues caused by record precipitation, spanning from the front of the #12 tee to the west rough #10.
- •Upgraded inadequate drainage systems between hole 13 and the 16th green.

- Undertook and completed the swimming pool renovation, ensuring it was finished by Memorial Day.
- •Kitchen equipment renovation. Removed old equipment and replaced with new.

Greg utilized cores from the May aeration, to maintain consistency with other putting surfaces. The decision to use these cores instead of sod resulted in a cost-savings of \$20,000.

The new 14th green spans an impressive 4200 square feet, featuring a false edge and bunkers for added aesthetics appeal.

A total of 210 tons of sand were used for the green mix.

The New 14

An estimated 400 tons of dirt was relocated from the new fairway bunker on the 15th hole to enhance the construction process.


Relocated the 14th fairway to accommodate the new green and approach.

Six new trees were strategically planted to improve the overall shape of the hole and offer additional protection for the new tee.

The old 14th green will serve as a nursery green, repurposing existing resources for future development.

Sand Bunkers

- 56 Bunkers.
- 54,000 square feet of liner for bunker construction.
- Installed an extensive 5,000 linear feet of drainage, equivalent to 1 mile.
- The bunker drainage systems is expected to substantially enhance the playability of the bunkers, improving overall course conditions.
- Exclusively responsible for procuring and overseeing the supplies for the construction.



Collar Dams

Dual Method- USGA*

1- "Now you see it, Now you don't"

25,000 sq ft of collar dam repair.

Top dress, aerification, to level surface

2. "Hole and Roll" Method

Multiple aerations and rolling to level surface.

Hole 12-17 remaining.

Tees 5,6,9,12,15 & 16

Hole 5: The Blue Tee has been relocated westward, creating a larger and longer tee to increase the challenge of the tee shot.

Hole 6: The Black Tee has been extended, resulting in a hole length of 575 yards.

Hole 9: The Black Tee has been lengthened by 30 yards. Existing Blue and black was lowered 18". Dirt was used to build new number 9 black tee

 $\label{thm:conditional} \mbox{ Hole 12: The Black Tee has been extended, adding an additional 15 yards and creating a longer and flatter tee.}$

Hole 15: A new elevated Black Tee has been introduced, playing at 210 yards.

Additionally, more teeing space was added to the existing white and blue tee area.

Hole 16: The tee has been extended to add length to the Black Tee.

Tree Planting

Hole 4: Two new trees have been planted behind the green.

Hole 12: Three trees have been planted south of the green, in the maintenance house yard.


Hole 14: Six new trees have been planted across the 14th fairway, and three new trees have been added behind the nursery green. These trees serve as an outline for the new 14th fairway boundary.

Hole 15: Nine new trees have been added along the brick wall, north, and east of the green.



Fairway Mow lines

- An additional acre of fairway has been incorporated, necessitating additional maintenance efforts to uphold its pristine condition.
- Implementing mow line extensions is pivotal to integrating the new course design. These extensions will play a key role in unifying the overall aesthetic and highlighting the new design of the course.



Pro Shop- Bob Wallis

Mr. Bob Wallis recognized the hole in ones this last year. This last year we did 21,494 rounds of golf. In 2022 we did 25,269. We were cut short 41 days of golf. We do significantly less rounds then the surrounding clubs.



Nyomy did an excellent job with the tournaments. Thank you to Ny, Jace, David Dickerson, Volkie Lund, and Jared Fowers. This year's tournament schedule is out. Mr. James Berger asked about outside tournaments of how many we are allowed to have. Mr. Wallis says we had 14 or 15 outside tournaments and now we are down to 12. Each tournament pays us \$150 per player. We netted \$240,000 on these outside tournaments. It would be \$60 per member extra to eliminate these outside tournaments.

2023 Financials- Cory Nielson

Mr. Nielsen says we as a board have a fiduciary responsibility to the members. At the end of 2023, we had 1.2 million. We are cash heavy. We had an assessment that brought in \$565,000. We borrowed \$800,000 for course renovations. Then we combined the \$800,000 with the previous debt and have a payment of \$10,200 each month. We are paying a little bit more than what we owe so that we save \$700,000 on interest by the time we pay off the loan. The sales trend is up. Mr. Nielsen explains that this last year we had ERC credits, PPP loans, and an assessment we can't rely on for regular cash flow. We are \$248,000 in the hole when we back out this unexpected revenue.



Questions and Answers- Mr. Randall

Jed Furhiman grew up on number 7 and has a lot of love for the club. Mr. Fuhiman has a couple of things to address. He's disappointed about what happened to Robbie Gale. He thinks Robbie would have been good at addressing the whole membership. Mr. Furhiman asks about the hiring of the new general manager. He says the letter that came out regarding Greg Gilmore, our Superintendent, was inappropriate. We need to do something about rumor control. Mr. Randall says with regard to Greg, that was a big deal. We addressed these concerns with Greg and Mr. Gilmore came in with his budget and gave us everything we

needed to know. We have a new game plan and have increased Greg's budget to make the golf course better. Mr. Durrant addresses the new GM. We have posted on Indeed and other platforms for a general manager who has a strong financial background and food & beverage experience. Mr. Rob Moore talks about the dynamics of other clubs in the area. They are raising initiation fees. Mr. Moore asks what is our max on our memberships and what is the goal with initiation fees. At other clubs you can't get a tee time so what is your philosophy? Mr. Randall says our max has been 375 equity members. Right now we have 382 equity members, but we try to keep it at 375. We have had debate on this. One of the perks of the OGCC is having less people on the course. We recently changed the initiation fee to \$25,000. This place is special because it's quaint and the board is not wanting to raise the membership numbers. The golf course and service should be everything it can be. When we were going over the financials, we were budgeting at a \$200,000 loss and with that the club can't exist. The bylaws do not allow us to run at an operational loss. Starting in 2020; labor, food, fuel, and chemicals have gone up notably. Raising member dues will be the most likely cause. The budget for this year does show a loss. We are not in the hole, but we need to fix a few things. A member asks why not take half of the revenue and do an assessment or raise dues. Mr. Randall agrees a dues raise or assessment will come. Mr. Moore says we aren't raising dues and assessments as much as other clubs he's a part of. The room applauds. The room agrees to raise the dues rather than have more members. The membership cap may need to be modified in the bylaws. Mr. David Baggott suggests capping the membership at 375. The best thing is getting on the course when we want to. Mr. Keith Hanchett asks if we are going to have guys watering the bunkers all year long. Mr. Randall says the bunkers will struggle, so we may need to add drip lines. Number 13 will struggle due to exposure. Greg is allowed the labor to help with this. Mr. Dave Baggott asks how many club committees we have and how do we sign up to be a part of these committees? Mr. Randall says we have a long list of committees. Each committee chair comes from the board members and they make the committee. Please email the chair to join the committee. We started a new committee this last year to create more events outside of golf. Mr. Casey Scott brings a lot of expertise. A member asks if they can see the financials to review what some of the expenses are. Mr. Nielson says yes they are available in the office and most expenses are labor. Mr. Fuhiman asks about the executive committee, is that in the bylaws. Mr. Randall says there is nothing in the bylaws about the executive committee. The president and secretary are part of the bylaws. Someone asked if the board can communicate better to the membership. Mr. Randall says yes and we are also working on posting minutes, bylaws, articles, ect. on the website. Ms. Keenan says 5-somes on Sundays hold everyone up. Mr. Wallis says we discussed this in our committee. A lot of the time it's perception of how fast they play or how it looks. The new cart's pace of play is 4 hours. Mr. Wallis says we play fast here and our pace is generally faster than 4 hours. Bob sees both sides and it's not a pace thing. A member suggests being more self aware.
